ANNUAL MEETING AND DIPTERIST'S DINNER NOVEMBER 9, 1985

FIELD MEETINGS IN 1985

Brannets Wood, Essex, 5 May 1985

Great Breach Wood, Somerset, 18-19 May 1985

Bill Dean, a hoverfly fan from Dorset, is leading a joint British Entomological and Natural History Society/Diptera Recording Schemes field meeting to this entomologically rich wood. Access is from the Street to Kingweston road at the Fountain Forestry entrance, and the meeting place is just inside the gate at 10.00 hrs (grid reference ST 5032 on OS 1:50,000 sheet 182). New Forest, Hants, 1-2 June 1985

Following the successful meeting at Mark Ash last year another joint BENHS/Diptera Recording Schemes field meeting is being organised, this time at two little-known localities. On Saturday 1 June meet beside the road at SU 262168 by 10.30 hrs for recording in Bramshaw Wood, and on Sunday 2 June meet at the car park at SU 228146 by 10.30 hrs for Eyeworth Wood. Both these sites contain much dead wood and should be productive for many of the ancient forest species. Thompson Common SSSI, Norfolk, 1 June 1985

A Norfolk Naturalists Trust reserve which is proving very exciting for Diptera, with excellent grasslands and pools. It is one of the best sites for pingos (a glacial landform with depressions now occupied by ponds)

whose fauna has very unusual species - and there is plenty of scope for adding to the species list and improving knowledge of habitat associations.

Berwick Pond, Essex, 9 June 1985

Woodwalton Fen National Nature Reserve, 22 June, 1985 Bedford Purlieus SSSI, 23 June, 1985

Woodwalton Fen, near Huntingdon is one of the major fens but relatively few dipterists have visited it. A visit to Monks Wood NNR can be included later in the day. For those of you who wish to stay, or come up on the Sunday, we propose visiting Bedford Purlieus to the west of Peterborough; this locality has the richest flora of any British woodland yet it is seemingly unworked for Diptera. A few other local sites are at hand.

The meeting will be linked to a British Entomological & Natural History Society meeting, including also coleopterists and hemipterists. Accommodation will be available Saturday night at Monks Wood Experimental Station (some work space also: bookings via Brian Eversham at BRC, Institute of Terrestrial Ecology, Monks Wood Experimental Station, Abbots Ripton, Huntingdon PE17 2LS). Charterhouse in Mendip, Somerset, 29 June - 7 July, 1985

The area has a great range of good quality habitats and there will be people knowledgeable on most groups of Diptera. NEWS FROM THE SCHEMES

Mosquito Recording Scheme

A new key to adults and the early stages is to be published by the Freshwater Biological Association, hopefully this autumn. It is hoped that more people will contribute to the recording of mosquitoes when these keys become available.

Larger Brachycera Recording Scheme

Hoverfly Recording Scheme

BRC has agreed to produce another preliminary atlas, again with about 30 maps. The genera in mind are <u>Sphegina</u>, <u>Brachyopa</u>, <u>Criorhina</u>, <u>Parasyrphus</u>, <u>Chamaesyrphus</u>, <u>Hammerschmidtia</u> and the Eristalinae. Maps of <u>Platycheirus</u> are planned for inclusion in the 1986 Hoverfly Newsletter. Any records of these genera would be particularly welcomed by the scheme organiser, Philip Entwistle.

Merodon equestris has a virus disease which has been recorded from form transversalis in France. Living examples of Merodon from Britain (any colour form) would be welcomed by Philip Entwistle for screening for the virus. The adult flies should be fed with a 10% honey or sucrose solution and sent live in a matchbox, or similar small container, to Philip Entwistle, Institute of Virology, Mansfield Road, Oxford OX1 3SR.

APPEALS FOR INFORMATION

Wanted - Opomyzids

I am preparing a revised key to this family and wish to figure the genitalia of males and females. I would like to see specimens of the rarer species, ie NOT Opomyza germinationis, O. petrei, O. florum or Geomyza tripunctata, although I would like to see males of G. balachowski because Vockeroth (1961) claims that it may be two species. I would be delighted to receive specimens in alcohol since this avoids having to damage the specimen for maceration. As hard-pressed ecologists don't have time to pin all their

catch, I hope to produce a key that works for both wet and dry material. I am also collecting distribution records for this family and for Lonchopteridae. Martin Drake, 16 Castle Crescent, Kendal, Cumbria.

Wanted - Information on Bibionidae

Information, observations or records of the family Bibionidae are requested to aid current research into aspects of the biology of the Bibionidae. 18 species occur in the UK belonging to the Genera Bibio and Dilophus.

Details of the distribution, life-cycle, abundance and behaviour would be welcomed in addition to any reports of plant damage in grassland, arable crops or other situations.

Stover Country Park, Nr Newton Abbot, Devon

During Diptera Recording Schemes field meetings based at Bovey Tracey in 1978 and 1981 visits were made to Stover Lake (SX 8375). University of Bristol Lizard Project

Records of terrestrial invertebrates, including Diptera, would be welcomed by the organisers of this project, which has been primarily concerned with flora and vegetation types of the Lizard. Any dipterists intending to record flies on the Lizard in 1985 should contact Mrs Stella Turk (Shangri-la, Reskadinnick, Camborne (tel. Camborne 712069)) for details of the potentially most valuable sites to visit. Some limited contribution towards travel expenses within the county could be available from Project funds to volunteers resident in Cornwall, or to those visiting Cornwall for other purposes but willing to record at the Lizard. Past records of Diptera from the Lizard would also be very welcome.

PRELIMINARY MAPS OF CATTLE-VISITING MUSCIDAE

Enclosed with this Bulletin are twelve maps of cattle-visiting Muscidae assembled from data sent in by contributors to the Diptera Recording Schemes, and from data abstracted from museum collections.

These maps already indicate different distributions for these species, though there is still plenty of scope for recorders to improve on our knowledge of these flies.

THE BRITISH ENTOMOLOGICAL AND NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY

The BENHS is the leading national Society for the field entomologist, organising a full programme of field meetings each year, and holding about 18 indoor meetings at the Society's rooms (74 South Audley Street, London WIY 5FF) with a wide variety of lectures on entomological and natural history subjects. An annual dinner and exhibition held each autumn provide an excellent opportunity to meet other entomologists and exchange ideas and information. There are dipterists present at most events organised by the Society. The Society's rooms contain an extensive library for the use of members, and comprehensive collections of British insects, including the Diptera collections of C O Hammond and H W Andrews. The Society publishes the Proceedings twice each year, and a list of the papers on Diptera published from 1973 to 1983 is included with this Bulletin. The Society also publishes books on British insects, most recently 'British Hoverflies' by A E Stubbs and S J Falk, which are available at a discount to members. The annual subscription is £9.50 for those residing within 30 miles of the Society's rooms, £5.50 for those living outside this area, and £2.50 for Junior members (under 21). OBITUARY - SIR ARTHUR DUNCAN

Sir Arthur Duncan died on 2 November. He was an active entomologist for many years based in Dumfries, a poorly worked part of the country. He recorded craneflies with the late E S Brown in the 1940's and 1950's (card index with scheme organiser) and attended some of the early Cranefly Recording Scheme meetings in London as well as several Dipterist's Annual Meetings. He helped organise and attended our Newton Stewart field meeting in 1979. He was the chairman of the Nature Conservancy from 1953 to 1961 and was a past Lord Lieutenant of Dumfries. We shall miss a friendly and enthusiastic dipterist. His collection (of various orders) is now at the Royal Scottish Museum in Edinburgh.
